What is Environment Wales?

Environment Wales is a partnership of organisations in the voluntary sector, funded by the Welsh Government. Our aim is to contribute to sustainable development by supporting and encouraging voluntary action to protect and improve the environment of Wales.

Set up in 1992, Environment Wales has grown year on year with the original partnership expanding from 8 to 9 organisations. WCVA is the initiative's Administrative Partner. It is responsible for providing the administrative and financial framework for Environment Wales and for hosting the Administrative Team. There are also 8 Operational Partners, which host the Development Officer Team. These are BTCV, Cylch, Groundwork Wales, Keep Wales Tidy, The National Trust, Eco Centre Wales, Cynnal Cymru-Sustain Wales and the Wildlife Trusts Wales.

The Development Officer Team works to provide community and voluntary groups with advice and support. Each project supported by Environment Wales is allocated a dedicated Development Officer who remains a constant point of contact. Environment Wales also provides funding through 5 different grant streams.

Who and what is eligible for Environment Wales support?

Environment Wales can support voluntary or community groups, charities, co-operatives, and other bodies with a not-for-profit status. We offer support to *projects* rather than *groups*, which must be specific activities rather than general core work.

In order to be eligible for Environment Wales support, projects must meet one or more of the following objectives:

- **Environmental Improvement:** Achieving sustainable improvements to the Welsh environment through practical projects;
- **Education and Awareness:** Increasing understanding of sustainable development and the environment through information, education and advisory services;
- **Environmental Enterprise:** Helping create new environmental initiatives which also allow communities and voluntary organisations to contribute to their social and economic needs;
- **Training and Volunteers:** Supporting and training staff and volunteers engaged in the above activities.

Projects must also complete the Environment Wales REGISTRATION process.

What is registration?

Registration is an opportunity for Development Officers to assess a project's sustainability and address any issues that might be a potential barrier to Environment Wales funding. The process can also help groups to think through their projects and fine-tune their objectives.

Registration applications are considered monthly, at the regular Development Officer meetings. The project's objectives will be considered, as well as the group's ability to deliver the project, the involvement of volunteers, issues of public access and land agreements where applicable, and whether the project contributes to the 4 key aims above.

Once registered with Environment Wales, projects benefit from:

- On-going support and advice from a dedicated Development Officer, with access to the combined experience of the whole Environment Wales Development Team;
- External recognition that can help with promotion, other funders or recruiting volunteers;
- Access to Environet – our free annual training and networking event.
- Becoming part of a network of sustainable environmental projects across Wales;
- Eligibility to apply for Environment Wales Project, Management, and Training Support Grants;

What are the next steps?

If you have a project that meets with Environment Wales aims and that you would like to register with us, please contact us on 029 2043 1727/1769 or email details of your project to info@environment-wales.org. Your email should include brief details of your group's activities and legal status (ie whether it is a charity, limited company, community group etc), together with your address and contact details. A Development Officer will then contact you to discuss your application further.

The Grant Funds

Environment Wales has 5 grant streams, designed to aid projects in each step of their development.

Two of these streams are available pre-registration i.e. for projects which may not yet be established enough to complete the registration process. These are:

Start-up Grants: These help to cover the costs involved with establishing new voluntary or community groups such as hiring venues, publicity or printing, training, insurance, affiliation etc. The maximum grant is £1,000.

Pre-Project Grants: These help cover the costs of any studies or surveys that need to be undertaken before a project can begin; for example feasibility studies, business plans, ecological surveys or community appraisals. The studies must be undertaken by a third party. The maximum grant is £4,000.

In both these instances, grants will only be awarded if the proposed project activities meet with Environment Wales' objectives and it is hoped that any projects benefiting from these grants will later come forward for Environment Wales registration.

There are 3 other Environment Wales grant streams, open to registered projects *only*.

Training Support Grants: These grants are available to help cover the costs of training courses and conferences. Eligible costs include travel expenses, subsistence and course fees. The maximum grant available is £400. Applications may be submitted at any time.

Project Grants: These grants help cover project materials and equipment. The maximum grant available is £10,000. Applications may be submitted at any time.

Management Grant: These grants help fund new posts within registered projects. The posts must be project-specific and not part of an organisation's core activities. Grants range from £1,000 to £12,000. Applications need to be received by the 15 October for awards starting on 1 April, the following year. Funding can be provided for up to a maximum of six years.

We encourage you to discuss your ideas or project at an early stage with your Development Officer. If you are interested in applying for any of the above funding, your Development Officer can provide the necessary forms and guidance.

Grant Funding - General Information

In considering applications for grant aid, Environment Wales will give priority to projects:

- which are working in partnership with other organisations;
- which are innovative or collaborative, and could be used as a model elsewhere;
- which encourage and support the participation of communities in local sustainable development;
- where a grant would raise the quality of work and achieve greater benefits for the environment;
- where a grant may increase the potential to raise income through a project

All project applications must have volunteer input and be able to clearly demonstrate how they meet with one or more of the four key Environment Wales goals on page 1.

Match Funding Requirement

Environment Wales can fund up to 75% of project costs. This means that at least 25% of costs must be met from other sources. Environment Wales recognises the importance of volunteer input to projects and records this as if it were a cash value (volunteer contribution is currently costed at £6.50 / hour). If there is sufficient volunteer time on a proposed project, smaller groups may use this contribution to make up the 25% match funding requirement. Larger groups will be expected to meet at least some of this requirement from other sources, which can include other funders, own resources or income-generation. Match funding can also be provided in-kind.

Limit on funding from Welsh Government Sources

Environment Wales is funded by the Welsh government, which is keen to encourage projects to secure support from a range of sources. Groups need to demonstrate therefore that the total amount of funding for their project coming from Welsh government sources does not exceed 75% of the total costs.

Other organisations providing funds that originate from the Welsh government include the Countryside Council for Wales, Wales Tourist Board, and some WCVA grants including the “Volunteering in Wales” fund.

Capital items

In compliance with the Welsh government’s audit requirements, details of any capital items over a certain value purchased with grants from Environment Wales will be registered. At present, the threshold value is £1000.

Guidance for School-based Projects

Environment Wales aims to support sustainable community-based projects. In order to demonstrate community engagement and support, we therefore require school-based projects to:

- Actively recruit and include volunteers from the local community at all levels of project activity (i.e. management and practical work);
- Allow regular access, to volunteers and the wider community, to the project at least 3 times a week or 100 days per year;
- Have suitable plans as to the long-term management and development of the project.

Please enclose with your application, on a separate sheet of paper, details of how your project meets these conditions.

Guidance for Land Agreements

In terms of land agreements for groups Environment Wales gives the following guidelines:

If a project is going to take place on land that is not owned by the project group, there must be a letter of support from the landowner confirming agreement to the project activities.

If the project will involve alterations to the land or capital expenditure in any way – eg erecting interpretation boards, creating a pond, planting trees – then we require the group to obtain either a lease on the land or a license agreement with the landowner. This is to ensure that the project outputs are protected and will not be in danger of being damaged.

We advise groups to obtain a lease or license agreement for a minimum of 10 years and preferably as long a duration as possible.

If it is not possible to secure a lease or licence on the land then, depending on the scale of the project, Environment Wales may accept a letter from the landowner stating that there are no plans to develop the land or invoke any kind of change of use to the land that would harm the project outputs for a minimum of 10 years.

If groups have:

- a lease with less than 10 years remaining;
- a licence that is renewed annually;
- any other land agreement with less than 10 years remaining or with an unspecified duration;

this must also be accompanied by a letter from the landowner confirming that there will be no threat to the project outputs for 10 years.

Grant Timeframe

Grants must be spent within the financial year in which they are awarded. Any sum left unspent at the end of a financial year must be reclaimed and returned to the Welsh government. This money would then be lost to the voluntary sector. If there is a danger that you will be unable to use your grant before the end of the financial year, you MUST inform your Development Officer immediately.

The Application Process

If you wish to apply for Environment Wales funding, your Development Officer will be happy to talk through your ideas and to provide the necessary forms and guidance notes. Please allow time for discussion, and perhaps revision, of your application before it is submitted.

No application can be considered until it has been counter-signed by a Development Officer and is received at the Cardiff office along with all requested supporting information.

Training Support Grants

Applications for Training Support Grants are considered by the Environment Wales Co-ordinator. Applicants can expect to receive a decision within twenty working days.

Project and Pre-Project grants

Applications for Project and Pre-Project grants are considered by the Environment Wales Grants Advisory Panel. The Panel meets approximately every five weeks until funds are exhausted (the Environment Wales grant year begins in April, with the first Panel meeting being held in March, funds are often completely allocated by December each year). Applications may be submitted at any time but must be received at least three weeks in advance of the Panel meeting at which they will be discussed. Your Development Officer can confirm the relevant deadline dates.

The Panel can approve, decline or defer applications. If an application is deferred – for example if more information is requested – it will be discussed again once all necessary details have been supplied and a decision will then be taken. Applications can also be ‘approved on condition’ – for example if a crucial piece of information, such as planning permission, has been promised but not yet delivered. In such cases, the Co-ordinator can decide if the condition has been met and authorise the grant – there is no need for the application to wait until the next Panel meeting.

Applicants will be informed of the Panel’s decisions usually within five working days of the Panel meeting.

Management grants

Applications for Management grants are considered annually. The deadline for applications is 15 October each year, with successful applicants being notified in early February, and receiving funding in April, of the following year.

Grant Payments

All Environment Wales grants are subject to WCVA terms and conditions, which are available from the Environment Wales Office and www.wcva.org.uk/grants. Project, Pre-Project and Management Grants are normally paid quarterly in advance. Training grants are always paid in arrears. Payment is made by BACS.

Reporting on Grant-aided work

As part of the grant application, projects submit targets that they hope to reach in the course of their grant-aided work. The targets measure:

- Number of volunteers:
- Number of volunteer weeks: (a volunteer week is calculated as being forty volunteer hours)
- Number of jobs created or safeguarded:
- Other funding that the project is able to draw in: (in cash or in kind, from public or private sources)

Progress against these targets will be measured at two points during the year by your Development Officer. Grant recipients are also required to sign ‘Green and Blues’ - Certificates of Expenditure and Targets – twice a year. The Green form asks projects to confirm that the grant is being spent in line with the original application, whilst the Blue form measures progress on targets.

NB: Targets are not requested or monitored for Training Support.

Further Guidance on applying for Grants

Please note: there are detailed guidance notes that accompany each application form. Please ensure that you read these before completing the application. Your Development Officer will be able to assist with any queries.

Management Grants

Management Grant Requirements

- Projects must be registered with Environment Wales.
- Funding is only provided for new posts. Environment Wales cannot provide funding for a post for which existing funding is coming to an end, except for renewals within our programme.
- At least 25% of the cost of operating the post should come from sources that do not derive from the Welsh government;
- Organisations applying for grant aid must be constituted, charitable or not-for-profit bodies.
- Where your application involves a site-based project, there must be public access to that site.
- All projects should produce clear environmental benefits, and demonstrate sustainable development in action.

Factors Favouring a Management Grant Application

Your application for management funding will have a better chance of success if it can demonstrate:

- An innovative and sustainable solution to current problems. (Sustainable solutions are considered to be those which are economically, environmentally and socially complementary)
- A strong element of volunteer involvement.
- Partnerships between voluntary sector organisations or between the voluntary sector and others.

Examples of Eligible Posts for Management Grants:

Education Officer, Project Officer, Publications Officer, Site Manager, Community Officer, Contracts Manager, Estate Worker, Volunteer Co-ordinator, Field Officer, Information Officer.

*Please note that this is not an exhaustive list.

Examples of Ineligible Posts for Management Grants:

Posts that already exist or new posts that are to maintain the organisation core functions.

Grant limit

Management grants are usually in the range of £3,000 to £12,000

Is funding available for more than one year?

Yes. Funding may be agreed for up to six years. The pattern is normally three years' level funding followed by three years' tapering funding. Note that in the example below, 100% represents the sum awarded as grant aid by Environment Wales, not 100% of project costs.

Year 1 – 3	100%	Level Funding
Year 4	75%*	Tapering funding
Year 5	50%*	
Year 6	25%*	

* Percentage of level funding amount

Projects will be appraised annually. Recipients are required to submit a renewal bid each year. Projects also undergo a full evaluation at the end of years three and six. The award of tapering funding is dependent on a favourable outcome to the evaluation at the end of the level funding period.

Project Grants

Project grant funding can help support the costs of project materials and consumables, hand tools, protective clothing, publication and printing costs, equipment hire, contractors costs (where justified), volunteer expenses, transport costs etc.

Project Grant Requirements

- Projects must be registered with Environment Wales.
- At least 25% of the costs must be met from sources that do not derive from the Welsh government;
- Organisations applying for grant aid must be constituted, charitable or non-profit-making;
- Projects involving work on or improvements to, land must have a suitable agreement with the landowner and there must be reasonable public access to the project site (There is further information on land agreements at the end of this section.)

Factors Favouring a Project Grant Application

Your application for funding will have a better chance of success if it can demonstrate:

- An innovative and sustainable solution to current problems;
- A strong element of volunteer involvement;
- That the project is ongoing rather than “one-off”;
- That project outputs can be safeguarded and maintained once the project comes to an end;
- Partnerships between voluntary sector organisations or between the voluntary sector and others.

Non eligible costs

- We can only fund up to £1000 of an individual capital item that costs more than £1000.
- We cannot fund land purchase, vehicle purchase or building purchase or works.

Grant Limit

- Project grants can be up to £10,000

Is funding available for more than one year?

Yes. However, applicants will need to make separate applications for each financial year in which grant aid is required. If a project intends to apply for further funding in consecutive years, Environment Wales would expect to see a business or strategy plan that shows this.

Guidance on Land Agreements

In terms of land agreements for groups Environment Wales gives the following guidelines:

If a project is going to take place on land that is not owned by the project group, there must be a letter of support from the landowner confirming agreement to the project activities.

If the project will involve alterations to the land or capital expenditure in any way – e.g. erecting interpretation boards, creating a pond, planting trees – then we require the group to obtain either a lease on the land or a license agreement with the landowner. This is to ensure that the project outputs are protected and will not be in danger of being damaged.

We advise groups to obtain a lease or license agreement for a minimum of ten years and preferably as long a duration as possible.

If it is not possible to secure a lease or licence on the land then, depending on the scale of the project, Environment Wales may accept a letter from the landowner stating that there are no plans to develop the land or invoke any kind of change of use to the land that would harm the project outputs for a minimum of ten years.

If groups have:

- any other land agreement with less than ten years remaining or with an unspecified duration;

This must also be accompanied by a letter from the landowner confirming that there will be no threat to the project outputs for ten years.

Start-up Grants

Start-up grants aim to support the start up costs of new groups, where the objectives of the group are directed towards long term action rather than the completion of a “one-off” project.

The Start-up grant helps with the costs involved with establishing new voluntary or community groups. These may include the hiring of venues, facilities and equipment, purchase of small items of equipment and hand tools, protective clothing, publicity and printing costs, training, insurance and affiliation.

Eligibility

- To be eligible for a Start-up grant, groups should usually be less than a year old.
- There must be a bank account held in the group’s name.

Non eligible costs

- We can only fund up to £1000 of an individual capital item that costs more than £1000.
- Land purchase, vehicle purchase and building purchase or works cannot be funded by Environment Wales.

Grant Requirements

- At least 25% of the costs must be met from sources that do not derive from the Welsh government;

Grant Limit

- Start-up grants can be up to a maximum of £1,000.

Pre-Project Grants

Pre-Project grants aim to support the costs of hiring specialists and consultants to undertake studies or appraisals that will lead to a practical project that meets with Environment Wales aims. A copy of the report of any such study must be submitted to Environment Wales.

Eligibility

- To be eligible for Pre-project funding, groups must be constituted;
- The grant can support a variety of pre-project studies, including feasibility studies, design studies, ecological surveys, community appraisals and business plans;
- The work must be done by external consultant(s) or specialists.

Non eligible costs

- Funding will not be provided for academic studies or theoretical exercises, nor where the proposed study is to be conducted “in-house” i.e. by staff already employed by the applicant organisation.

Grant Requirements

- At least 25% of the costs must be met from sources that do not derive from the Welsh government;

Grant Limit

- Pre-Project grants can be up to a maximum of £4,000

Training Support Grants

Training Support Grants aim to support the training of staff and volunteers working to promote sustainable development and the environment.

Wherever possible, those supported on training courses are expected to disseminate any resulting knowledge or skills within their organisation, so as to maximise the effectiveness of the grant.

Eligibility

- Applications must relate to a group's Environment Wales-registered project;
- Eligible costs include travel, subsistence and fees for courses or events run by third party organisations;
- Occasionally, grants may be offered to help a group organise its own training course (through contracting an external trainer), if a need can be demonstrated.

Ineligible Costs

- Courses run "in-house" by the organisation's own staff;
- Costs associated with routine events or conferences, which could be considered to form part of the normal affairs of the organisation;
- Environment Wales will not normally support multiple attendances by staff and/or volunteers from the same organisation at the same event, unless a special need can be demonstrated;
- Environment Wales cannot support individuals to achieve academic qualifications.

Grant Limit

- Training Support Grant can be a maximum of £400

The Grants Advisory Panel

WCVA, as the administrative partner of Environment Wales, is legally responsible for the operation of an effective grants system. A key part of this process is the Environment Wales Grants Advisory Panel.

The Grants Advisory Panel is made up of volunteers recruited for their skills, experience or specialist knowledge. Recruitment is done through a mixture of open advertisement and invitation to help ensure the maximum spread of knowledge, skills and geographical representation. Panel meetings rotate around Wales and are often accompanied by visits to Environment Wales projects to allow members to see the impact of Environment Wales support on the ground.

As might be expected, some Panel members may have a connection with groups that are coming forward for funding. Members are required to complete a Register of Interests before they join the Panel and all interests are declared at the start of each meeting. If a member has declared an interest in a particular group which has submitted a grant application, that member is required to leave the room whilst the application is discussed, returning only when a decision has been taken.

A copy of the register of interests can be obtained from WCVA.

Environment Wales Service Standards

Environment Wales, as an initiative funded by the Welsh government, has a duty to meet certain standards. We aim to meet these standards at all times. However, if there is a chance that our response will be delayed, we will notify you of this fact, and give the reason.

General Enquiries

General enquiries concerning Environment Wales will normally be responded to within seven working days.

Applications for Project Registration

Applications for project registration will be determined, and applicants notified of the outcome, within six weeks of receipt. Where an application is deferred pending clarification of details, the outcome will be notified within four weeks of the additional requested information being received. In the case of refusal of a registration application, applicants will be informed of the reason for refusal and will have the right of appeal to the Environment Wales Steering Group.

Applications for Grant Aid

Whilst funds are still available, applications for grant aid will be determined, and applicants notified of the outcome, within twenty working days of the relevant grant deadline. Where an application is deferred pending clarification of details, the outcome will be notified within forty working days, provided the additional requested information has been received. For rolling (Management) grants commencing on 1 April, formal notification of application outcomes will be made when the Welsh government officially notifies Environment Wales of its budget settlement. We expect this to be in early February of each year.

In the event of an application for grant aid being refused, applicants will be informed of the reasons and will have the right of appeal to the WCVA Board.

Payment of Grant

Grants will be paid in advance each quarter. Payments will be normally be made within ten working days of the start of each quarter provided that claims have been submitted in accordance with grant conditions and evidence of match funding has been received.

Note: Training Support grants are paid in arrears, after receipt of a claim form and relevant supporting documentation.

Contact with Projects

All organisations and projects in receipt of grant aid will be visited by their monitoring Development Officer at least once during the course of any financial year.

The Environment Wales Partnership

Nine organisations form the Environment Wales initiative. Each operational partner employs a Development Officer, with funding from Environment Wales, whose role is to further the work of the initiative within their own organisations and to maintain links with the other partner organisations.

WCVA is the administrative partner and employs the Environment Wales Co-ordinator, Organiser and Administrator. These staff members, along with the Development Officers, form the Environment Wales Development Team.
